CONSENT AGENDA REPORTS

MD19 BUILDING REPORT by Dan Cantrell, Chairperson:

"The roofing project at the MD19 Office has been completed. This included new gutters, downspouts, complete tear off of three layers, and re-sheathing the entire surface. There was about \$1,900 of additional costs for some

repairs needed to complete the project and a decision was made to replace all the fascia board rather than spending the additional labor hours to cut out the extensive rotten portions, and fit in new board. The fascia board was primed and then painted prior to the installation of the new gutters. This project was completed at a total cost of \$18,054.40.

Additional work needs to be completed as the gutters were leaking in several areas and have caused rotting on the eaves. Further review is needed to determine the amount of repair that will be required. Also needed is caulking that will be done at the time of the repairs.

Finally, all the trim areas of the building need to be scraped and repainted soon to prevent further long term damage. It is hoped that a volunteer group will step forward and take on this project."

BUDGET AND FINANCE REPORT by PDG Brien Patton, Chairperson:

"The Council has received the accountants report for last year. EST Peter will answer any questions that you may have.

The budget so far is in line to where we would be at this time. We will review the budget at the Winter Council Meeting for adjustments. A couple of lines I will point out are Line 85 which is the loan payment for the new car. We owe \$9,510.22 for the new vehicle. This is a no interest loan from the MD19 Lions Service and Leadership Foundation. We will pay \$300 a month starting October 30th. We also received a matching grant from the Foundation. The rest we are paying out of our reserve. Line 162 EST expense of \$2,509.73 is mileage for Peter using his own car for Lions business. The negative of \$23,959 includes \$18,182 for the new roof which came out of the building reserve account that we didn't show as income as the money we already had.

WEBMASTER REPORT by VCC J.D. Nellor, Chairperson:

"The new MD19 website launched in June 2018, shortly after the Spring Council Meeting and training sessions.

There were a couple of challenges with the launch, the most significant of which was that the host server of the existing website, www.lionsmd19.com, was not big enough or fast enough to handle the new site. Some pages simply rendered as blanks. But, as luck would have it, I discovered that the domain name 'lionsmd19.org', which had not been available, suddenly was available. So I reserved the name and then loaded the new site under the new domain name to a new host (inmotionhosting.com, the host of my office account, on temporary basis), and launched the new site on www.lionsmd19.org. It took about 24 hours for lionsmd19.org to seed the internet (both lionsmd19.com and lionsmd19.org were up for a short time). Once lionsmd19.org was up and running, lionsmd19.com was shut down. All traffic to the old address (www.lionsmd19.com) was redirected to the new address: If you typed www.lionsmd19.com into your browser you ended up at www.lionsmd19.org; and you still do and you probably did not even notice it.

So, where did lionsmd19.com go? It is still there. And I recommend keeping it there, at least for the time being. There is little reason to get rid of it as it is part of the MD19 phone service package (Qwest.net, now CenturyLink), so it does not cost anything to keep the site, and the cost is minimal (\$10.00 to \$15.00 a year) to retain rights to the domain name lionsmd19.com.

What happened to the old website that was on lionsmd19.com? It is still there, just in case we need something from it. The public just can't get to it. And archive copies have been made. It should be okay to delete the old website from the servers after the first of next year.

As an aside, the lionsmd19.com address was also serving the MD19 email accounts. Those are in the process of being changed to lionsmd19.org email accounts—the .org accounts actually work right now, they just forward through to the .com addresses. That will be reversed once all the MD19 computers have been configured to the new accounts and we are sure they are working properly. In either case, both addresses work. For example, if you send an email to Peter at either md19est@lionsmd19.com or md19est@lionsmd19.org, he will get it.

The big test for the new site was entering the 2018-2019 club, officer and committee data. That was one reason the site launched in June— so I could go through at least one an 'annual' update and see what the challenges would be entering a new fiscal year's data. That process began in August. It took about eight hours total time to get the new data entered and formatted. Next fiscal year it should take much less time.

The new website appears to be working well; Lots of positive comments, which is nice.

The process of updating the site with changes seems to be working. Clubs send changes and updates to the MD19 office constantly, which are forwarded to me, and I make the change.

The site changes frequently: new ads, new events, removing old events, adding documents for download. Hardly a week goes by without some change. That is a good thing!

The latest additions to the site are: The Lions Journey (with a video!); a Site Map (table of contents) and a topical Index. The site is getting big—there are currently 144 pages—so I added the site map and index pages (even though they make the site bigger) to help visitors find things.

There is no dedicated search function on the site—perhaps in the future, we will see. But all current browsers have a Find function that works very well. What? You didn't know your browser had a Find function? Well, here is how you use it on the most common browsers out there... pass the word:

In Safari: Either type <command><f>, or select 'Find' from 'Edit' in the menu bar. In the search bar that opens, type in the text you want to find.

In Google Chrome: Either type <command><f> (on a Mac) or <control><f> (on a PC), or select 'Find' from 'Edit' in the menu bar. On some PC versions of Chrome you can also click on the hamburger menu or the three dots in the upper right corner of the window and select 'Find' then in the search bar that opens, type in the text you want to find.

In Firefox: Click the 'Menu' button (it looks like 4 horizontal lines) in the command bar at the top of the window. Then select 'Find in This page...'. In the search bar that opens, type in the text you want to find.

In Microsoft Edge: Click the 'More Actions' button (it looks like an ellipsis) in the upper right of the command bar at the top of the window. Then select 'Find on page'. In the search bar that opens, type in the text you want to find.

In Microsoft Internet Explorer 9, 10, 11: Click the 'Tools' button (it looks like a gear) in the upper right of the command bar at the top of the window, or press <control><f>. Then click and hold on 'File', and then select 'Find on this page'. In the search box that opens, type in the text you want to find.

What's next? In no particular order:

- Move the site to its own account—it's currently living on my office account. There is a cost that we need
 to budget for: about \$6.00 to \$9.00 a month depending on the hosting package. Between the domain
 name registrations and the hosting, we should budget about \$90.00 to \$120.00 a year for the website.
 The timing: the second half of this fiscal year.
- Getting the Districts to use their District pages. So far District G has been sending District information to post on its page(s), and District C has started posting its District newsletters on its page. But beyond that, the District pages are under—utilized. Get the word out to the Districts!
- Building a database to implement what I learned from the fiscal year updates in July and August. The goal is to build a database of all MD19 members and clubs that the MD office can use. It will (or can) look like the Excel spreadsheets that are currently being used to store and format data that goes to the website and that is used in the Roster. Once that is done, the MD office should be able to edit the information on the fly, which will automatically update the website, and use the data to make and update the Roster. And then, we can create a version of the Roster that those who want it can download from the website. The timing: Most likely 3rd quarter of the fiscal year, but I may want to go through one more manual annual update.
- Turn all of the forms on the website into fillable pdf files.
- Create data entry pages so that Zone Chairpersons (and Clubs) can fill out and file their MD reports from the website, instead of downloading the forms, printing them out, filling them in, and mailing or emailing them to the MD19 office.
- Create payment pages where Clubs and Lions can make online payments of MD19 assessments, registrations for the MD19 conventions and council meetings, and the like.
- Fully documenting the site for successor webmasters.
- Getting a committee of webmasters to monitor and help update the site. I have one volunteer so far. I
 would like nine.

I hope you are all enjoying the site. And I encourage everyone to let me know what can be done better, what you would like the website to do, and to not be shy about reporting corrections, errors and omissions."

INTERNATIONAL YOUTH EXCHANGE / YOUTH CAMPS REPORT BY PDG George Robison, Chairperson: "This past summer, four youth from MD19 travelled abroad; two from 19I and two from 19C. They have been asked to submit reports of their trip for publication in the *Border Crossing*, but none have been received. For

their trip, the MD19 Lions Youth Exchange Foundation provided them with pins, flags, folding backpack and polo shirts, all with the MD19 YEP logo and their name on the polo shirts.

Unlike a year ago, when hosts for nine youth from Australia were found in about two weeks, this year host volunteers have been sparse. One youth from Australia placed herself with a host from 19C who had hosted her friend last year. We are still trying to place one youth from New Zealand and two from Australia. Although there potentially are hosts for two of the three, the hosts still need to indicate acceptance of the youth.

Three districts have yet to name a Youth Exchange Chairperson.

An email request for donations to the YE Foundation was sent to every club in 19C and the MD19 office was asked to send it to all clubs in MD19, but only three clubs have responded with a donation, all in 19C. Donations are intended to fund scholarships to assist youth in paying travel and incidental expenses. Two scholarship applications were received last year and two scholarships were awarded. Scholarship applications will be available after October 1st.

For well over a year, starting shortly after the death of the long-time Foundation Chairperson and Treasurer, PDG Ron Silver, we tried to get a response from the TD Canada Trust branch in Quesnel, B.C., and finally got a response and some action. During the MD19 Convention, I and present Treasurer Tammy Allan will visit the Whistler branch to sign new paperwork and eventually transfer the funds to Banner Bank in Washington State, where Tammy lives.

It is hoped that every DG and every VDG will promote Youth Exchange and the YE Foundation during their club visits. It is simply not possible for me or the District YE Chairpersons to visit every club.

Please support the Youth Exchange Program and the Foundation, which are separate entities. The Foundation is a Washington State Charitable Corporation and donations are tax exempt pursuant to U.S. IRS Regulation 501(c)(3). Anyone and any Lions Club can donate."

LEADER DOGS REPORT by Debbie Mansell & PDG Carol Whitman, Co-Chairpersons: "Leader Dog 2017-2018 Fiscal Year Statistics (July 2017-June 2018)

Guide Dog Training-184 clients served. Of the 184 clients served, 125 reside in the US and seven (7) were from Canada. This fiscal year, clients were trained from 32 states in the US. (WA-5, ID-1)

Orientation and Mobility Training -92 clients served. 88 were from the US. (WA-2 and ID-1) three (3) clients were from Canada

Summer Experience Camp- 18 youth clients were served. No attendees from WA, ID or Canada.

As of June 2018, Leader Dog has served 16,208 clients and there are 1,496 active Leader Dog teams.

US total-949 (WA-18, ID-2) Canadian total-59

LEO REPORT by ZC Barry Shiles, Chairperson:

1. "Dual LEO Chairpersons for Districts H, I, D and E.

After discussions with Lions Clubs International it has come to my attention that we are an exception in worldwide Lions Districts. MD19 has four districts that cross international borders (Canada/USA) and these Districts have large geographical areas. Both of these issues have caused the LEO Chairpersons difficulty in promoting and servicing their LEO responsibilities. As a result, the District Governors and MD LEO Chairpersons, in order to better promote expansion and care of LEO Clubs, have instituted a dual LEO Advisor system; one in the US and one in Canada. This has helped expand our number of LEO Clubs. It has helped us better promote 'Awards and Recognition' of our LEO's and LEO Clubs. Our MD 19 Problem is LCI only recognizes one LEO Chairperson per District. We can ask for an exception to this rule.

The change of rules in the Constitution at LCI level is far too complicated just to accommodate our needs in MD19, for these four Districts, so asking LCI for an 'exception' is our best way for us to help LEO's and LEO Chairpersons. In my conversation with LCI I was assured dual LEO Chairpersons can be made to happen. My one concern is, while it is okay at the present time, what happens in five years when there are new staff at LCI and the MD19 LEO Chairperson has changed and no one remembers why this exception exists? This will remain a problem for future Council Chairpersons and District Governors for the affected districts. The appointment of dual LEOs Chairpersons will have to be pointed out to LCI staff every year should MD19 wish to continue the practice.

 The 2019 USA / Canada Leadership Forum is in Spokane, WA and the Planning Committee recently met for four days. The committee members came from all over North America, mostly PDG's and Past International Directors and one Zone Chairperson. There will be 90 plus panels presenting a great opportunity for Lions learning and training. Between two to 3,000 Lions are expected to attend.

The Saturday component at the Forum will be designated 'LEO Day' with the entire day dedicated to LEO panels and service activities for LEO's and Lions. Lions recognizes the importance of youth/LEO's to the future of Lions International. 'Leos are the future of Lions'. I highly recommend Lions from our MD19 attend, as this opportunity may not come so close for quite some time. There will many great panels and opportunity to meet Lions from all over North America and maybe even our International President.

- 3. Our Dual Leo District Chairpersons is actually working: District H has its US Chairperson working on at least three new clubs in their area.
- 4. Adventures of MD19's LCI LEO Liaison Kyle Boutillier: LEO/Lion Kyle recently attended the USA / Canada Leadership Forum in Columbus, Ohio and the International Board of Directors meeting in California. The International Directors that I met in Spokane were amazed by Lion Kyle. In future years we'll be able to say we knew Kyle as he goes on to bigger and better things in Lions and life.
- 5. LEO Club Excellence awards: As far as I know MD19 has had two winners of this prestigious LCI Award: District A, Moscrop LEO Club and District E, Creston LEO Club. Congratulations to these outstanding clubs. I do suspect there are more winners of the Excellence awards but LCI does not inform the MD and District LEO Chairpersons on who they are so we can't brag about all our outstanding LEO's and Clubs. The only way we learn of a winner is for the Club LEO advisor to inform everyone. Communication and publicity is one way we can promote the LEO Program in our Multiple District.
- 6. Congratulations to PDG Grace Hwo and 19A on the formation of a new Omega LEO Club. This club, Metro Vancouver LEO Club is the first Omega LEO Club in MD19. The Charter Celebration was November 4th at the Vancouver East Lion's Den.
 - In 19A, the Sunshine Coast Lions Club is working with their high school to establish a new LEO Club and 19H's LEO Co- Chairperson PZC Bruce McNair is working on two new LEO Clubs on Whidbey Island and at Camp Horizon. The LEO Advisor's hard work and determination will bear fruit in the near future. We all wish them success in establishing and continuing to grow our LEO Program.
- 7. LEO Video Contest: November 1, 2018 was the deadline date for Leo Video Contest entries. MD19 hopes to have at least one entry in this LCI contest.
- Lions Service and Leadership Foundation LEO Essay Contest: Proud to announce we have three
 outstanding LEO Winners: 19D LEO Elise Brulotte, Cascade High, Leavenworth, WA. (Senior, first place
 \$1000 USD); 19H LEO Ewen Suelzle, Earl Marriott (Senior, Second place \$750 USD); 19H LEO Paige
 Kruse (Junior, first place \$1000 USD.).

This was the first attempt at this type of contest for LEO's and youth. The start-up was difficult and the Leadership Foundation deemed more interest was needed if it was to continue or consider having the LEO Advisors take over and we might be able to continue the contest in that way. Proposal to follow.

This contest and others offered to LEO Clubs and LEO Members is a very positive way to offer perks and incentives to LEO's with a view to improving participation and building our LEO Program.

The MD19 LEO Program is strong and growing. We have many outstanding LEO's as witnessed by the number of awards they have won. We can be very proud of the Lions Clubs for sponsoring and administering; the District LEO Chairpersons for promoting and encouraging Lions and Lions Clubs to participate in this rewarding program."

LIONESS REPORT by Linda Schaffrick, Chairperson:

"The Lioness clubs for MD19 are all keeping busy.

There are 13 Lioness clubs in MD19 with 239+ members (have lost some members due to moving and deaths, but the clubs are working on getting new members).

The clubs are still in full swing although a little quieter over the summer. This report is for five months (May - September)

A brief overview of the some of their activities for this report: catering for bridge tournament; helping at Camp Winfield's 50th anniversary; assisting at bingo's at Senior home; Space Burger booth at the fair; assist seniors with groceries shopping and gardening; ambassadors for Beachfest; held garage sales and bake sales; worked at fall fairs; coffee and cookies at a rest stop; stuffing backpacks; legacy bingo; collecting used eye glasses; assisted at a costume museum; Dragon Boat Festival; worked the Red Cross loan cupboard; Youth Ambassador program; Highway to Healing fund raiser; feeding Cops for Kids riders; delivering school lunches; holiday tray favors for hospital patients and seniors home; breakfast for 500 firefighters; Lions Foundation Dog walk and registrations for mammography van. A good way to honor hard working members in your Club. Also, the promotional contest with three regional prizes of airfare for two to Milan, Italy and two registrations to the 2019 Lions International Convention next July is being sent out to the Clubs this month. Another good way to support Lions Quest and their very valuable programs.

LCIF – US EAST REPORT by PDG Bob Yeoman, Chairperson:

"Most of you by now have heard about Campaign 100. This is a very aggressive and very doable program that Lions Clubs International Foundation has embarked on for the next three years. It is our goal as Lions to donate \$300 million over the next three years while serving 200 million individuals annually.

LCIF has done so much in the last 50 years; unfortunately there is so much more to do. FOUNDATION REPORTS

CLERC REPORT by Barry Shiles, Chairperson:

"The glasses keep coming in and Lions keep serving those with sight problems. The child who is taken out of school to lead their blind grandmother around, or the child who can't see the board to read in school and misses out on an education. The grandmother that has not seen her children in 30 years. Lions have the ability

to fix these problems at no cost to the sight impaired and blind, our core project as Lions.

A small personal story about my experience and the things Lions do on faith. I'm diabetic and get my eyes checked every year. Now, Lions collect used glasses knowing that the Club CLERC chairpersons will send them off to Calgary for fixing, cleaning, packaging and shipping to countries around the world. Then, these glasses are shipped to eye camps, sight camps all over the world and then given to the sight impaired; people who have just had cataract operations at these camps can now see again. All done on faith but never really done on a personal basis.

The stats from CLERC Calgary have one line in them - Kathmandu, Nepal - 1188 pairs of glasses. When I asked my doctor where his last Mission was he said it was to Kathmandu, Nepal. I told him I was the MD19 CLERC Chairperson for BC Lions and his comment was, 'We get our glasses from them, about 1000 pairs for my last mission.'

There in the stats is the faith part of my story about Lions. The circle is closed and the glasses we collect go exactly where we want and think they are going. We have the satisfaction of knowing our work here benefits many sight impaired throughout the world. It actually happens.

NW LIONS FOUNDATION REPORT by Bill Lundin, Board Chairperson:

"It is with great pleasure, that I present some great news on the growth of SightLife and the Northwest Lions Foundation for 2018.

SightLife continues to not only serve the Pacific Northwest with outstanding service, but has reached incredible projected growth of over 12,000 corneal transplants. In addition, we will provide over 20,000 corneal transplants to needy people in our global program.

In 1925 Helen Keller challenged Lions 'To be knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness'. SightLife's Global program is now achieving that goal in India, Nepal, China and Mexico. In all cases we are often working with Lion Leaders in those local communities. These include educational, treatment and prevention programs.

The Northwest Lions Foundation Board of Trustees continues to work on expanding our Health Screening Programs. Our mini- screening program has grown to four units, in addition to our large screening unit. We now have just over 100 Lion members trained to provide screening services. By the end of the year we will have screened over 35,000 children and provided hundreds of high quality digital hearing aids, in collaboration with many of clubs across the State. Finally, we distributed over \$120,000 in project support grants to ten agencies throughout the State of Washington.

MD19 STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

CONSTITUTION & BY-LAWS REPORT by PCC Larrie Taylor, Chairperson:

"Ongoing review of Constitution and Bylaws and Policy Manual

The Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson have struck an ad hoc committee to look at both the MD's Constitution and Bylaws and the Policy Manual. One of their objectives was to try to eliminate any duplication of overlaps in these two documents. A second objective was to investigate the possibility to adopt the LCI Standard MD Constitution and Bylaws document [amended to retain our special or unique clauses]. This work is under progress.

The following recommended changes were submitted in a previous report and are essentially on the ballot at the upcoming MD Convention.

ARTICLE I 'BL'

Election of Multiple District Officers and Voting on Amendments to Constitution and By-Laws SECTION 1. The Chairperson of the Convention shall call for nominations from the floor of the Annual Convention on the day preceding that scheduled for the election of officers. A list of the nominations for the offices of Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson of the Multiple District shall be furnished by the Multiple District Executive Secretary-Treasurer to the Election Committee.

Replace with the following:

SECTION 1. Voting for the Offices of Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson shall occur at each District's Spring Conference as explained in ARTICLE IV 'Officers' SECTION 3 b. The MD19 Office will prepare the ballots and the Voting Certificates for the MD19 Officer elections held at the District Spring Conferences and will provide a list of the number of delegates and alternates allowed for each club. A majority of the votes on any ballot, exclusive of blanks, shall be necessary for election to any office.

SECTION 2. When voting on proposed amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws at the MD19 Annual Convention, the Credentials Committee shall verify the voting certificates of the delegates and alternates prior to voting. A list of all registered delegates and alternates in each

SECTION 3. The Multiple District Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall prepare and furnish to the Election Committee ballots bearing spaces for the Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson of the Multiple District and identified only as First, Second, Third etc. ballot. The Multiple District Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall, also, prepare and furnish ballots with the proposed amendments printed thereon with blocks marked 'For' or 'Against' opposite each proposed amendment.

SECTION 4. The Polling places shall open at 7:30 A.M. on the day of election and shall remain open until 11:30 A.M.

Replace with the following:

SECTION 4. The Polling Places shall be open and the election procedure shall follow the times and procedures printed in the MD19 Policy Manual in Chapter VI "CONVENTIONS AND CONFERENCES #A. ANNUAL CONVENTION under #33.

It is recommended to the MD19 Policy Manual Committee that this title 'Hours for Certification of Credentials' be changed to 'Hours for Certification of Credentials and Voting'.

SECTION 5. Delegates desiring to vote shall present their voting certificates at the Polling Place and be checked against the list of registered delegates and if qualified, shall be furnished a ballot. Each delegate shall mark their ballot in secret, and deposit it in the ballot box.

SECTION 6. At the time specified, the Election Committee shall close their ballot box and shall retire and count the ballots, reporting their findings promptly to the convention session.

SECTION 7 Renumbered to SECTION 5.

A majority of the votes on any ballot, exclusive of blanks, shall be necessary for election to any office. (Moved to ARTICLE 1 'BL' SECTION 1. above)

SECTION 7 (Renumbered to SECTION 5)

See Article VIII, Section 1 of the Constitution for the requirements to pass proposed amendments to the Constitution.

See Article XI BL Section 1 for the requirements to pass proposed amendments to the By-Laws.

It is deemed that the following Sections of Article I BL would be more appropriately moved to Article IV 'Officers' to define the process for announcing the election results, to define a process should there three or more candidates for the position of Vice Council Chair, to define a process should the incumbent Vice Council Chair not receive a simple majority of votes cast for the candidacy for the position of Council Chair. Move SECTION 8 AND SECTION 9 of ARTICLE I 'BL' TO ARTICLE IV 'Officers' as letters c. and d. See below:

ARTICLE IV 'Officers'

Add to Section 3.b. as the last sentence the following:

b. Voting for these Officers shall occur at each District's Spring Conference ...the counting of the ballots will be within seven (7) days of these last District Conferences. 'The results of the Election for the offices of Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson will be announced at the MD19 Spring Council Meeting following the district elections.'

c. In an election where there are three candidates or more for Vice Council Chairperson and no candidate receives a majority vote for an office, the same shall be reported to the Council at the MD19 Spring Council Meeting following the district elections. All candidates but the two candidates with the highest number of votes will automatically be dropped and a second and subsequent ballot shall be taken by email vote of the clubs in each district. The email vote will be conducted by the MD19 Office. The results of the second ballot will be announced by the MD19 EST by email to the Council of Governors within three days after the ballots have been counted.

d. In the event the incumbent Vice Council Chairperson stands for election as Council Chairperson and at the election fails to secure a simple majority of the affirmative votes cast by the delegates present and voting, he/she shall be declared not elected and a vacancy in that office shall be declared."

CONTESTS AND AWARDS REPORT by PDG Janet Rinehart, Chairperson:

"It is important to note that the rules for Contest & Awards are now on the MD19 website; they are not printed in the roster. This will assure the information is available to everyone, and, therefore everyone can rest assured the same rules will apply to everyone.

I really want to emphasis that since there have been several instances when we have been asked to make a 'slight adjustment' in order to accommodate certain situations. The rules must be the same for everyone in order to be fair for everyone.

I have received a number of questions, comments and suggestions regarding the Contests that perhaps do need to be considered.

In one case, the C&A committee (which is only one person, at this time) was asked to review the rules regarding the Distinguished Service Award. Currently, to be considered for this award, a person must have served at least four (4) years in some capacity at the MD level, such as being multiple district chairperson, committee member or volunteering at the MD19 office. The situation now is that there are committees with fewer than the designated number of districts represented, which then reduces the number of members eligible to be considered. If the proposal for combining the Constitution and By-laws committee with the Policy Manual committee passes, another opportunity for meeting the eligibility requirements is lost. I recognize the difficulty the Council Chairperson may have here, but I fully recommend each committee position be filled so that each district is represented and, therefore, addresses this requirement for the Distinguished Service Award. The question is: should we consider changing the requirement for this award or fill each position as the current rules stipulate.

Another concern brought to my attention is the problem that arises when zone chairpersons do not follow through on their responsibilities thus denying club secretaries the required credits necessary to earn the Excellence Award. In this case the secretary followed all of rules and would have had enough points had the zone chairperson done his/her job. Should the requirements for Secretary Excellence be adjusted?

Another suggestion I received is to reinstate the Club Treasurer Excellence Award, which is added to this report. I do not know when or why this contest was dropped, or if it ever existed, but I have the proposed rules for this as they were presented to me. As far as I can tell, the rules could apply to treasurers on either side of the border. I don't know who submitted the Club Treasurer Excellence Award info to be included with the reports for this meeting, but at this point, I consider it as 'proposed' or 'examples' so my question to the Council is: Should the C&A committee consider adding the Club Treasurer Excellence Award?

I had submitted my original the Contests and Awards report before I knew that the '3- Minute Video' would be on the agenda. I first heard a Video Contest mentioned while waiting in the airport in Las Vegas. On the flight home I tried to formulate what this would look like but, basically, was counting on hearing from the person(s) who had this great idea. I would be glad to work on this in order to present the proposed rules/points at the next Council of Governor's meeting. Again, please, if – when – you have a Contest suggestion, let the committee know, but be sure to give some foundation and/or background information.

Finally, and most importantly, I want to thank those who stepped forward and graciously volunteered to help with the judging during this convention."

MOTION: A motion was made by PDG Wanda Carisse, 19-D and seconded by District Governor Sharon Sikes, 19-C to keep the criteria the same for the MD19 Distinguished Service Award. Motion passed.

"CLUB TREASURER EXCELLENCE AWARD RULES

To all Lions Club Treasurers who qualify for this honor, Multiple District 19 presents a Treasurer Excellence Award at the Annual Convention following their term of office. This Award shall be given by the Contests & Awards Committee based on the statistical record of the MD19 Office for the period of July 1 to June 30. A Charter Treasurer of a club is eligible to receive this Award if the Club's Charter Night is held prior to October 1, and a minimum of 290 points is earned. Questions concerning the decision of the Committee must be sent in writing to the MD19 Contests & Awards Chairperson by December 31, of the year in which the Secretary's term of office is completed.

TO QUALIFY FOR THIS AWARD, A MINIMUM OF 290 POINTS MUST BE EARNED FROM THE FOLLOWING:

POINTS

1. The Treasurer shall have served faithfully and diligently, for a minimum of six (6) months, during his/her term of office as attested to by the Club President.

2. ZONE, DISTRICT AND MULTIPLE DISTRICT MEETINGS

(140 points)

- A. He/she shall attend his/her District Conference during his/her term of office. (50 points)
- B. He/she shall attend the MD19 Fall Annual Convention during his/her term of office. (25 points)
- C. He/she shall attend a treasurer training session at the zone or district level. Attendance at the meeting will be reported on the Zone Chairperson leadership training form. If the training session was not held by the preceding Zone Chairperson, or by the District, the current Zone Chairperson, or the District, may hold a training session by September 30th. A treasurer may attend and receive these points. (50 points)
- D. He/she shall attend his/her club planning session during his/her term of office. (15 points)

3. GOOD FINANCIAL STANDING

(25 points)

- A. His/her club shall be in good financial standing with the Multiple District as of July 1st. (15 points).
- B. Semi-annual MD19 dues paid in or before September and March. (10 points)

4. TIMELY FILING TAX RETURNS.

(50 points)

Timely file the required annual IRS tax return for the previous fiscal year. If there is no requirement in the club's jurisdiction for filing a tax return, points are automatically awarded.

4. ANNUAL BUDGET PRESENTED AND APPROVED BY THE CLUBS BOARD OF DIRECTORS (50 points)

By September 30 of the current physical year present and have approved a budget for the club and its foundation if applicable.

6. FINANCIAL REPORTS PRESENTED TO THE CLUBS BOARD OF DIRECTORS (max 60 points)

Present a monthly report of the financial activities to the board of directors. (5 points per report per month)

TOTAL POSSIBLE POINTS: 325

All Club Treasurers who earn the required number of points through the above criteria must submit a Club Treasurer Form to the Multiple District 19 Office postmarked by July 31st of the following Lions year. The form is required to be signed by the Club President and Club Secretary. **The Multiple District 19 Office will email out this form to all Lions Club Secretaries in March.**"

MOTION: A motion was made by District Governor Mark Mansell, 19-G and seconded by District Governor Mike Dukes, 19-I to include into the MD19 Contests and Awards the Club Treasurer Award contingent upon further work to clarify criteria and points. The Club Treasurer rules will be brought back to the Winter Council Meeting for a vote. Motion passed.

The 3-Minute Video concept will also be brought back to the Winter Council Meeting with accompanying rules and points for consideration.

ARTICLE I "BL"

Election of Multiple District Officers and Voting on Amendments to Constitution and By-Laws SECTION 1. The Chairperson of the Convention shall call for nominations from the floor of the Annual Convention on the day preceding that scheduled for the election of officers. A list of the nominations for the offices of Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson of the Multiple District shall be furnished by the Multiple District Executive Secretary-Treasurer to the Election Committee.

Replace with the following:

SECTION 1. Voting for the Offices of Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson shall occur at each District's Spring Conference as explained in ARTICLE IV "Officers" SECTION 3 b. The MD19 Office will prepare the ballots and the Voting Certificates for the MD19 Officer elections held at the District Spring Conferences and will provide a list of the number of delegates and alternates allowed for each club. A majority of the votes on any ballot, exclusive of blanks, shall be necessary for election to any office. SECTION 2. When voting on proposed amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws at the MD19 Annual Convention, the Credentials Committee shall verify the voting certificates of the delegates and alternates prior to voting. A list of all registered delegates and alternates in each

SECTION 3. The Multiple District Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall prepare and furnish to the Election Committee ballots bearing spaces for the Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson of the Multiple District and identified only as First, Second, Third etc. ballot. The Multiple District Executive Secretary-Treasurer shall, also, prepare and furnish ballots with the proposed amendments printed thereon with blocks marked "For" or "Against" opposite each proposed amendment.

SECTION 4. The Polling places shall open at 7:30 A.M. on the day of election and shall remain open until 11:30 A.M.

Replace with the following:

SECTION 4. The Polling Places shall be open and the election procedure shall follow the times and procedures printed in the MD19 Policy Manual in Chapter VI "CONVENTIONS AND CONFERENCES #A. ANNUAL CONVENTION under #33.

SECTION 5. Delegates desiring to vote shall present their voting certificates at the Polling Place and be checked against the list of registered delegates and if qualified, shall be furnished a ballot. Each delegate shall mark their ballot in secret, and deposit it in the ballot box.

SECTION 6. At the time specified, the Election Committee shall close their ballot box and shall retire and count the ballots, reporting their findings promptly to the convention session.

SECTION 7 Renumbered to SECTION 5.

A majority of the votes on any ballot, exclusive of blanks, shall be necessary for election to any office. (Moved to ARTICLE 1 "BL" SECTION 1. above)

SECTION 7 (Renumbered to SECTION 5)

See Article VIII, Section 1 of the Constitution for the requirements to pass proposed amendments to the Constitution.

See Article XI BL Section 1 for the requirements to pass proposed amendments to the By-Laws. Move SECTION 8 AND SECTION 9 of ARTICLE I "BL" TO ARTICLE IV "Officers" as letters c. and d. See below:

ARTICLE IV "Officers"

Add to Section 3.b. as the last sentence the following:

b. Voting for these Officers shall occur at each District's Spring Conference. the counting of the ballots will be within seven (7) days of these last District Conferences. "The results of the Election for the offices of Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson will be announced at the MD19 Spring

Council Meeting following the district elections."

c. In an election where there are three or more candidates for Vice Council Chairperson and no candidate receives a majority vote for an office, the same shall be reported to the Council at the MD19 Spring Council Meeting following the district elections. The candidate with the least number of votes will automatically be dropped and a second and subsequent ballot shall be taken by email vote of the clubs in each district. The email vote will be conducted by the MD19 Office. The results of the second ballot will be announced by the MD19 EST by email to the Council of Governors within three days after the ballots have been counted.

d. In the event the incumbent Vice Council Chairperson stands for election as Council Chairperson and at the election fails to secure a simple majority of the affirmative votes cast by the delegates present and voting, he/she shall be declared not elected and a vacancy in that office shall be declared.
