Another great quote: "Let's go forward and do great things." - - PDG Sharon Sikes



Joe Nilles, DG 19-D

Why do we go to the MD annual convention? For most of us it to greet old friends, make new friends, and to learn something new. Last fall in Wenatchee, I was wandering the halls visiting with Lions and stopping at vendor booths to see what they had



to say. I stopped at one booth which was demonstrating a vision screening device. I was shown the device, told what it was for, its importance, and used it. At that time, on our own club level, I didn't see the use we could make of it. Imagine my surprise when 3 months later, our local school district nurses came to us and asked if the Leavenworth Lions Club would purchase one.

They explained how under current rules, they have to check the eyesight of every student in grades K, 1, 3, 5, and 7 annually. This takes a lot of time and requires hall space in which to use the old eye chart. Students who have learning disabilities can't always stay focused, respond, or fully understand what is wanted of them. A vision screening machine, uses the time it would require to take a picture. And it finds problems within the eye that the chart can't identify. The results are automatically sent to a computer. The nurses can check the students in a far shorter time, which leaves more time to deal with other health issues. This screening can catch eye problems that the old methods can't. We are in the process of purchasing a unit. We will retain ownership, so we can take it to other schools or venues.

I know of other clubs in our district that have purchased similar devices and are taking it to schools in their zones to do the vision screenings. This is what it really means to assist the visually impaired. It is hoped this project will create new PR for the club and perhaps gain new members.

Joe was born in Ephrata, Jan. 1948, and raised on a farm in Northern Douglas County. He attended two years of college at WSU. He met his wife, Dorothy, as the result of a blind date. They married in March of 1968.

Dorothy and Joe returned to the home farm in 1968, and bought it from Joe's parents. They farmed until 1989 when they sold the farm and moved to Leavenworth, WA. They raised two children on the farm. Their son Allan is retired as a Lt. Col. from the Air Force and now teaching 5th grade. Their daughter Diane is the CEO of the local hospi-



MD19 Knights of the Blind (KOTB)

On October 18, 2020, the Lions Multiple District 19 Council of Governors voted to endorse the MD19 Lions Knights Of The Blind (KOTB) Committee. To some it may seem redundant to a have a specific committee of "Knights of the Blind" when it was the Lions as a whole who accepted Helen Keller's 1925 challenge to Lions to be the knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness. And, truly, Lions Clubs around the world have excelled in our efforts to avoid preventable blindness. But fewer clubs have been able to make a difference in the second part of our Global Cause of Vision: "to improve the quality of life for people who are blind or visually impaired." That is the mission of the KOTB. In other words, we want to let the Lions know what it is like to be blind – not just the challenges faced but the abilities of the blind, and to provide the blind with the access and information needed to become active Lions, and involved members of our communities.

The idea for this committee originated with PDG Art Ruben, Everett Central Lions Club, based on discussions with blind Lions as well as other Lions involved in activities with the blind. After several months of discussion and planning, Council Chair Al Hedstrom added the presentation of the committee to October Council meeting. After further discussion, the Council of Governors agreed that a committee devoted to this effort is within the scope of MD19 Lions by its endorsement.

To move to action we identified the following goals:

 To actively interact with blind and visually impaired individuals in our local communities and listen to their needs. Continued on page 12

A Word from our International Director

Here we are in the first part of 2021 and everything that was wrong with 2020 has been fixed, right? Well maybe not, but at least there is a bit of light at the end of the tunnel and it is not a train.

If people do not travel outside their local area, their vision of the world is based on where they are. The vision would be that the needs, issues and



concerns where they are most likely dealt with in the same manner everywhere. For those of us who have traveled, we understand that such is not the case.

Generally, in North America, our Lions world has the same general issues. We have all been exposed to the COVID-19 virus to varying degrees. How the challenges associated with dealing with the virus have not been the same though. We all have the issue of having the International Border being closed to non-essential travel. If members are not comfortable in the virtual world, how about walking them through the process? Attending some of the online social events are great ice breakers as well as a lot of fun. 2021-2022 Lions Convention Goes Virtual

Dear Lion,

Due to the continuing concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the board of directors voted to transition the 2021 Montreal Lions Clubs International Convention to a virtual event that will be delivered totally online. This decision was made with the health and safety of our Lions, staff and vendors in mind as limiting international travel and large gatherings is key to global containment strategies.

Although we are disappointed that we won't be able to host this event in person, we are excited about hosting our first virtual international convention that can safely connect Lions from around the world. We are still finalizing the details of your new convention experience, and will share those with you as soon as they are ready.

Here are some important details about the 2021 virtual convention we'd like to share with you:

- Everyone's invited Our 2021 convention will be a virtual event that's open to all Lions and Leos around the world.
- Registration fees The registration fee will be US\$50 until March 31, then US\$75 beginning April 1. The registration fee for Leos will be US\$30 regardless of date. Convention is currently scheduled for June 25-29. Additional event and registration details will be provided soon.
- Current registrants Lions who are currently registered for convention will receive an email soon with more information about their registration options.
- Elections Executive officer and international director elections will be conducted electronically, and voting procedures will be forthcoming.
- Convention updates Check our convention website LCICon for convention updates and details as they become available.

This global health pandemic has forced us all to make decisions and changes that place health and safety first. However, we are optimistic that with each new day there is hope, and as Lions, we continue to find new ways to stay connected, safely serve our communities and continue our global mission of service.

If your Lions club, district or multiple district has a foundation, which is a separate legal entity, the appropriate form will need to be filed as well.

Distric 19-G Awarded DCG Grant to Assist Willapa Harbor Hospital Purchase Equipment

In October of 2020, District G learned that Willapa Harbor Hospital was running a fund raising campaign to purchase a new 3-D mammography unit for their small community hospital. Currently, women in the community are traveling to towns with larger medical facilities to have their breast screenings with this latest technology. 2nd Vice District Governor Debbie Mansell contacted the hospital and learned about the efforts to purchase the mammography equipment.

The LCIF District and Club Community Impact Grant (DCG) proposal was brought to the District Cabinet meeting on November 7, 2020 and was approved by the Cabinet to pursue a \$2,500.00 grant from LCIF. 2nd VDG Debbie completed and submitted the LCIF grant application. Ron Brummel, President of the Willapa Harbor Lions, was instrumental in spreading the awareness of the cause in the community. Not only did his club make a donation toward the purchase of the equipment, Lion Ron approached the other area service clubs (Elks and Kiwanis) and a local community foundation (LV Raymond) and raised several thousand dollars in addition to their club donation to support the hospital's efforts.

District and Club Community Impact Grants (DCG) offer a new opportunity for Lions to support humanitarian activities in their communities. DCG funding is provided to districts and clubs from their own contributions to the foundation. Lions can pool DCG funds together for a collaborative project or use DCG funds as a local match for another LCIF grant. In just over two years, more than 1,000 DCG's totaling US \$3.9 million dollars, have been used by Lions to make a significant impact in their communities. For more information about the qualifications and application process for DCG funds, search on the LCI website.

On January 11th, District G received notification from LCIF that the grant to assist Willapa Harbor Hospital was approved. The check is currently being processed and within a few days it will be delivered to the hospital.

I urge the clubs in our district to pursue some bigger projects in your communities. With DCG funds available, your club's dreams to assist your community can become a reality!

Club Officers for the Lions year 2021-2022 should be elected prior to April 15th. Your PU101 (International) must be completed and received by LCI AND the MD19 Office on or before May 15th. Instructions for doing the PU101 online with your clubs' MyLCI site can be found in the MD19 Contests and Awards Book under Secretary Excellence Award Rules. An AWeber notification with the instructions will also be sent in March.

Malden-Babb and Pine City On the Road to Recovery

Malden and Pine City, Washington communities have a long road ahead of them after a 2020 fire swept through on Labor Day weekend. Many of the estimated 206 Malden and Pine City residents were displaced (132 families including 70 children), and eighty-percent of the homes and businesses were destroyed, including a food bank that had recently been equipped with a new refrigerator, freezer, microwave, and used tables.

A true hero during this devastation was the Rosalia Lions Club who managed the relief efforts. More specifically Secretary Linda Pritchett, who put her job on hold for several weeks, came to manage the relief center and coordinate the relief efforts with other organizations. Linda was surrounded with helpers President Barbara Botham, Lori Furman, Lesa Kuehne, Dr. Mary Widman, DVM, who attended to all injured and displaced animals, Monique Hanson Newman, and many other outstanding volunteers. Through their efforts, water, food, clothing, bedding, medicine, coats, equipment and funds donated by many Lions Clubs

and citizens, were collected and distributed to the Malden-Babb

and Pine City community members.

After talking with Malden's food bank director Bob Law, District 19-E came to the realization that the needs of Malden and Pine City and the surrounding areas would be best served by replacing the food bank's equipment destroyed by the fire in Malden.

After applying and receiving a District/Club Community Grant, I am happy to say that the Malden Food Bank is operational in a temporary facility. Plans are in the works to rebuild a community center that will house the food bank among other organizations.

- To partner with organizations of and for the blind and visually impaired.
- To increase membership and support blind and visually impaired in Lions.
- To assist where possible to obtain tools, devices, information and services to improve access for the blind and visually impaired.
- 5. To educate and raise awareness of blindness and visual impairment in our local communities.

Since the formation we have approved a constitution for the committee, defined and elected a governing council for the committee. This includes Chair (Andy Arvidson), Vice-Chair (Danette Dixon), Secretary (Colette Arvidson), and District Representatives for 7 of the 9 Districts. The District Representatives serve as liaisons with the District Governors. At-large membership on the committee is open to any current member of a Lions or Leos Club in MD19 interested in supporting this effort. We are especially interested in finding District Representatives for District D and District I.

At this time over 80% of our members are blind or visually impaired. The two past District Governors on our committee serve to guide us on the road to progress, as well as give us an informed connection to the Lions as a whole. We are interested in having more at-large members, especially Lions who are blind or visually impaired who can share both the challenges and solutions they have found to full participation as Lions. We also want to identify the projects implemented by clubs, especially in MD19 to share with other clubs that support our mission, so we can share this information throughout MD19. Did you know that Lions Clubs in Georgia, in collaborations with Learning Ally have been reading and recording the Lions Club Magazine for over 20 years and make it available to any interested Lions – Lions reading for Lions! Additionally, National Federation of the Blind provides a synthesized reading of the magazine via an app called NFB Newsline that provides this type of service for many periodicals. How many of your members could benefit from either of these services?

We have formed a sub-committee to look at the accessibility of Lions web sites and materials and have found that some are, and some are not. The KOTB is working with Antoinette Polk of LCI and Peter Anderson of MD19 to identify and prioritize areas of accessibility. We can then share information with all MD19 Lions who could benefit.

It is our wish that Lions from around MD19 get to know our committee and invite us to your District, Zone or Club meetings as appropriate. We want to get to know you and want you to get to know us. We meet at 6:30 PM the first Tuesday of the month on ZOOM.
