Renew, Reenergize, Rebuild

We serve in challenging times! Our Multiple District membership is shrinking despite our best efforts.

The Governors and Zone Chairs have direct access to the ears of our members. They are key to convincing our Lions to renew themselves, re-



build their Clubs and reenergize their members so they remain relevant in their Communities. Our Leaders' roles have changed over the past 10 years. They are being trained to work in teams that set goals and implement action plans. Does this approach work? Yes, it does.

It hit home for me at a District Cabinet meeting. A Club President asked me to give him a hand unloading some eyeglasses that his club had collected for recycling. I was surprised when we unloaded box after box totalling some 7,000 pairs of glasses. This little Club of about a dozen Lions was helping 7,000 people to see well.

To borrow an expression from my Lion Colleague PCC Hal Palmer, "What if." What if this Lions Club had ceased to exist? 7,000 glasses might not have been recycled, and 7,000 people might not have been helped. What we do as Lions, Lioness and Leos is so important.

The remarkable thing about this Club? It was in turmoil just a year earlier. The Club was about to disintegrate, but they asked for help. The Governor, through the Club Support Team, sent in two conflict resolution facilitators. This was followed by participation in the Club Excellence Process (now called the Club Quality Initiative). The Club members worked through their difficulties and made a plan for success. The Club turned around. They didn't give up. They were renewed, reenergized and are currently rebuilding.

We can turn things around, we do not have to do things the way we have for decades, and we can reinvent ourselves. If you have some influence in your Club, please convince your members to undertake the Club Quality Initiative (Club Excellence Process). This process allows you to look at what is working and what is not, and to create a plan for change. It costs nothing but a little of your time, and it works.

How Can Lions Clubs Benefit by Using Trained Facilitators?

Clubs succeed by planning ahead, setting goals, and having members who work as a team. Lions Clubs want to succeed in their efforts to serve the community, create and execute projects, and recruit new members. But sometimes it is difficult to establish goals and define the tasks needed to achieve them. This may happen for a number of reasons such as dominant personalities in the group, the shyness of some members, group conflicts or weak leadership. Using a trained outside facilitator can be a valuable, efficient way to establish a club's goals and objectives.

Using a facilitator in a club planning session produces several benefits:

- The results of a session will be viewed by the members as group decisions. Members will feel committed to the success of these decisions.
- Everyone has the opportunity to contribute and will feel a part of the team.
- Usually group decisions are higher quality than individual decisions because the "best" of many ideas are selected.
- Members realize they are responsible for implementing decisions because they helped to shape them.
- With everyone having the opportunity to participate, there is usually less negativity and low morale surrounding group decisions.

The facilitator's primary job is to establish communication between the club's members during the process of establishing goals and the associated tasks. Facilitators set the rules as to how group members will work together and use their skills to stimulate group participation while minimizing group conflicts.

We are in the process of creating a pool of trained facilitators by offering the M19 Facilitator Training Course at different locations throughout this Lions' year. The next one is scheduled at Moses Lake on November 1. The exact location will be announced by the Fall Conference. This is an 8 hour course (session below) and covers the role and skills of the facilitator, group dynamics and conflict resolution. Lions who would like to attend this course must submit an application to the MD19 Faculty Development Chairperson. Future offerings of this course will be scheduled in response to demand and held at locations according to the number of applications from each District.

Membership Key Awards What are They?

Each of the 17 Membership Keys acknowledge the importance of asking new members to join your Club. They recognize the number of new members a Lion has sponsored! The Keys are automatically issued after the new members have remained in Lions for a year and a day.

It all starts with those first two members you sponsor and mentor so that they want to remain members for at least a year and a day. Each Year, we honor our MD19 Key Members at the Fall Annual Convention on Friday at the Luncheon. Without Key Members, the health of our organization would be in jeopardy.

Eligibility for a Key Award:

- New member must be a Lion for a year and a day to qualify unless the sponsored member dies, transfers or moves from the community before the year and a day has been reached.
- Name of new member with sponsor's name, member number and club number must be reported on club's WMMR
- Charter, transfer, and reinstated members do not count towards a Key.
- Only one sponsor per new member can receive credit for a key.
- A sponsor can't get more than one key of the same type.

Each Key is a lapel pin with a clutch back. The Senior Master Key (sponsoring 25 members, above) comes with a distinctive medallion and presentation ribbon.


