Lyndon Harriman The Latest on Redistricting

Since the vote to redistrict on June 4, 2022 passed, the committee has been working feverishly, putting together documentation on the process and progress Multiple District 19 has made. Real progress has occurred in polishing the packet that will be presented to the Lions Clubs International Board of Directors. This



packet has to be completed and in the hands of the Board by early August. This will allow the Board to review the information and form positions to discuss during the October LCI Board meeting where a vote will be taken to approve or deny our petition.

While the Strategic Planning Committee (SPC) has made real progress, many pieces of misinformation floating around have come to my attention. Most of these indicate that clubs cannot afford to make the change. I want to address these issues.

One I have heard several times is that clubs will have to buy brand new vests due to redistricting. This is totally false, there is no need or requirement to purchase new club vests. Your current vest will work just as it was intended, to identify your members while they are participating in a club activity. In most cases, vests do not designate your zone or your district, and if new ones were purchased, they wouldn't either. Coupled with this lament, is the notion that new name badges would also be required. Again, in most cases, your name, your Lions Club and perhaps your office is indicated. There is no need to purchase new ones. Still another complaint that has been passed along to me is the need for new banners and the expense associated with that. Again, the club banner does not indicate your zone or your district in most cases, so you won't need to replace it. Zone banners may need to be replaced if the zone designation changes. However, a good seamstress should be able to remove the old number and sew on a new one for a small fee, not a huge expense.

The only requirement regarding zoning is that it would need to be uniform across the district, so new district L could have zones L-1, L-2 or S-3, N-5 etc. and each new district could use this easy method of zone identification. Realize that the cost of a new or altered zone banner would be shared by the clubs located in that zone, making it a minimal amount. The district banner, however, would need to be replaced or again altered by a seamstress with the new designation; L, I, O, N or S depending on your new district. This cost too would be spread across the entire district, and the District Governor has funds that will cover this cost.

The minimal cost in materials to redistrict will not cost any member a single cent. Clubs, zones and districts will need to alter or purchase new banners. The cost to those entities will be determined by how much they are willing to spend. In fact, redistricting should impact the local club at little to no cost. Redistricting is shifting of our internal boundary lines to change from 9 districts to 5 larger ones. Your local club and members will continue serving your community, just as you always have to the best of your ability.

White Cane Safety Day In Penticton or Locally October 15, 2022 Will You Join the Celebration?

As we prepare for the 101st MD19 Annual Convention, did you know that this year we share that date with International White Cane Safety Day? That makes it the perfect time to reflect:

To many, the image of a curved handled white cane has become the symbol of a plea for support of a disabled community in need. A symbol used by Lions Clubs and others to raise money for important services to prevent blindness or

assist people who are blind. But for those who are blind October 15, White Cane Safety Day, as it was named by the US Congress in 1964, or Blind Americans Equality Day as it was designated by President Barack Obama (2014), the meaning is best exemplified by the updated logo/label you can purchase from LCI (Lions Club International): A solid blue circle with a current-day straight white cane with a White Cane Day banner attached noting "Lions Support" above the banner, and the words "Independence, Mobility, Safety," below the banner. Whether a blind person uses a white cane or a guide dog to improve their access to and independence in the world, White Cane Day is a celebration of the abilities and achievements of the blind and a commitment to inclusion, accessibility, and safety, locally and internationally.

While some Canadians also participate in the October 15th observance, many continue to celebrate White Cane Week, as they have since February 3, 1946, when the Canadian National Institute for the Blind (CNIB) and Canadian Council of the Blind (CCB) jointly made that proclamation.

As we approach this day, the MD19 Lions Knights of the Blind Committee (KOTB) encourages all Lions Clubs, Zones and Districts to join in the celebration to increase Awareness of the meaning and importance of the White Cane among our Lions Clubs and within our communities! Planning Ahead While Traveling

My wife, Peggy, and I were very excited to travel to Montreal for the 104th Lions Clubs International Convention in late June of 2022. I, as the recently elected incoming Council Chairperson, was anxious to meet the District Governors Elect in person and experience with them the transition into District Governors. The loss of my crown from one of my molars the night before we started the trip, (As of this writing, I am still waiting to have it reglued), was a portent of things to come. It was certainly a memorable trip.

Pre-COVID 2019, we had planned a spring break trip to the Bahamas to get some sun and relax. Spring of 2020, everything shut down and our carefully arranged travel plans and nonrefundable tickets were useless. However, our travel agent managed to get us credit for the tickets and the airline allowed us two years to use the funds. So, we used the credits to purchase tickets to Montreal. We arrived in Montreal on time, got through customs and collected our luggage and proceeded to our hotel. Finally, we were able to relax and enjoy our stay. A wonderful time it was, marching in the parade, attending the plenary sessions, listening to the speakers, voting, shopping at the Lions store and booths, spending time with other Lions from our Multiple District, and enjoying dinner together. It was a special time.... WOW!

Soon enough the convention ended, and we began preparing for our return trip, a retracing of our steps for the journey home. That evening, my wife tried to check us into the airline, she received her boarding pass on her phone. Sadly, I was unable to check in electronically. Peggy called the airline, and they informed her not to worry that I'm checked in for the flight.

The next morning, we arrived three hours early for check in and baggage. The airline attendant ran off our boarding passes and we proceeded to TSA/security. Peggy cruised through without a hitch, of course she gave me the carry-on luggage. Whoa, I was flagged for a "THOROUGH SEARCH" as my ticket has four S's across the top and four S's across the bottom. Before I even got to the magnetometer, I was patted down and a wand is sweeping over me. 
