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North Shore Zone 19A-2 Youth Exchange with Chiba, Japan

Vancouver North Shore Lions of Zone A-2 have engaged in an annual Youth Exchange for 44 continuous years. The City of North Vancouver is Sister City to Chiba, just south of Tokyo, Japan. Since the early 1970s, nearly 500 students have flown across the Pacific to be hosted by local families for 16 to 25 days.

In Japan, many civic events and visitations take place in both Chiba & Tokyo, sightseeing in Hakone and the Mt. Fuji area, the Kamakura Temples and the Bosou Peninsula. Pictured here are Canadian students and



their chaperone (me) sightseeing in Tokyo. In Greater Vancouver, students visit the Howe Sound corridor to Whistler, a Pool Party & Garden Bar-B-Q in West Vancouver, and spend time in Victoria and Seattle. On both sides of the Pacific, there are official gift exchanges and luncheons with the respective city mayors and Summer Festival participation. The students have a great time, but they also grow and mature in the process.

Zone 19A-2 Lions Clubs and the city of North Vancouver provide most of the funds needed by the exchange. Students apply in writing, submit an essay as to why they wish to travel to Japan, and go through a rigorous selection process. I am always impressed by the quality and eagerness of those chosen to act as Canadian ambassadors to our sister city in Japan.

BULLETINS? WHY? HOW?

When I started this year as your Council Chairman, I stated that I wanted to emphasize Public Relations and its benefit for our Multiple District. Why Public Relations?

To be successful, any business, government or club must have some means of verbal or written communication. Large businesses,



like Proctor and Gamble, General Motors, Walmart, Toyota and Anheuser Busch, spend billions of dollars each year on advertising and promotion. Not surprisingly, the businesses that spend the most on advertising (PR) also lead the way in sales volume.

Our Lions Clubs are doing amazing acts of kindness in their communities. Think how much more we could do if the community knew what we were doing. Acts of goodness attract like-minded people.

Look at the many clubs that are struggling with membership or leadership issues. It is almost a sure bet that these clubs do not have a regular bulletin or newsletter. Its few remaining dedicated members do not take the time to let those disinterested members know what they are accomplishing or what they hope to achieve.

Point to any successful and active club, and it is also a sure bet that they have a regularly published newsletter or bulletin to keep the members informed about what is happening. And, it is distributed not only to their members, but to other clubs, zone and district officers, who are then aware of the successes of their club.

A club NOT publishing a bulletin is like a Man winking at a woman in the dark. He knows what he is doing, but she doesn't.

Please consider appointing a club PR chair to increase interest in what you are doing.

Who should be the PR chair (or co-chair)? A member who attends meetings regularly and can feel the 'pulse of the club', and who is sincerely interested in Lions. You don't need to be a journalist.

- 1 Write several short snappy articles rather than 2 or 3 long stories.
- 2 Have a catchy heading for each article.
- 3 Be positive!
- 4 Editorialize, but let them know that it is your opinion.
- 5 Briefly describe the last meeting. Make the absentees wish they had been there.
- 6 Promote the next meeting. Make it interesting, so that they will want to come.
- 7 Mention members' names. First and Last. Everyone likes to see their name in print.
- 8 Write about members' birthdays, anniversa-

- ries, trips, babies and illnesses.
- 9 Write about projects and visitations.
- 10 Highlight new members and their families.
- 11 Promote Club, Zone, District, MD, and Int'l programs and conventions.
- 12 Use humor, but keep it clean.

Your District and Multiple District PR chairs are always willing to help if needed.

Effective Public Relations could very well be the key to increasing service in our communities with added membership.

Linda and I send best wishes for a Happy and memorable Holiday Season. You and your fellow club members are doing great things in your community. Your community appreciates what you are doing; you also should appreciate what you are doing.

Young People are Our Future





> is never too late to begin, but the sooner you get started, the better prepared you will be to participate at your district conference. There are some very talented people in our Multiple District, so I am looking forward to having the winners of the district conference competitions in every one of the contests at the MD19 Fall Annual Convention in Pasco next October. Put on your thinking caps and come up with an entry for at least

one contest in this year's competitions.

There have been some changes to the rules for several of the contests, so please make sure you read the rules and become aware of them. Contest Rules can be found here on the MD19 website or in the Roster, which all club secretaries and presidents receive. Contact the MD19 Office if you need a copy of the Roster.

The individual(s) who participate in the Contests work hard at their timing and presentation, so it is disappointing if they are disqualified because they did not read the rules. Some examples of disqualifying entries:

> Achievement Award – The rule states that the presentation shall be limited to "that phase of the activity that has been completed during the current club year." In the past we have had contestants who were disqualified because their talk was not about the participant's club or an activity

that was completed during the current year.

Scrapbooks - We have had them submitted for years other than the current year, which disqualifies them.

Brochures & Business Cards - If you win one year and enter the contest the next year, a copy of the winning brochure or card from the previous year must accompany the current year's submission or you will be disqualified. There must be a 25%

change in current year from the previous year, so the judges need to see both.

I look forward to a great year with lots of participation at the District Conferences Contests and Awards; let me know if I can be of any assistance.

In mid-January the MD19 Office will be emailing out to the Club Treasurers or Secretary-Treasurers the **MD19 Second**

Half Dues Statements. If no email address is available, a hard copy will be sent to the Treasurer's address as it was reported on the 2014-2015 Club Officer Report Form. If you do not receive a dues bill by the end of January, please contact the MD19 Office, so that we can confirm your email or mailing address and resend the bill. MD19 Dues for the second half are based on the membership total recorded on the WMMR due December 31, 2014, plus pro-rated dues for any new members brought in from July to December.

Candidates for MD19 Council Chairperson & Vice Council Chairperson: Your letter of Intent, your Club's Letter of Endorsement and your Zone's Letter of Endorsement must be received by the MD19 Office, the current District Governor of your district, the current Vice District Governor(s) of your district and your Zone Chairperson on or before December 31st. This is a Constitutional requirement.

MD19 POLICY MANUAL CHANGE:

At the request of EST Patty Allen, Chapter III, "Memorial Garden" Item #4 was amended at the MD19 Fall Annual Convention Council Meeting in Ocean Shores, October 16th, removing the approximate price list data for Memorial Plantings and replacing with the words, "Call the MD office for current prices and suggestions for types of living memorials." In its entirety the amended portion reads:

"CHAPTER III

BUILDING AND HEADQUARTERS

4. Memorials: The cost of memorials will include the cost of soil and bark or cement as required, a metal plaque, the memorial itself (tree, bush, bench etc.) associated expenses, and future upkeep of the landscape. Returning Canadian students and their families host the following year's Japanese students in B.C. This works well because the host students have experienced life in Japan and are eager to give in return. Similarly, the returning Canadian chaperone is the host and liaison to the following summer's Japanese chaperone.

The great majority of chaperones are seasoned Lions. I was lucky enough to be a chaperone in 2006 and shall never forget the courtesy I received and many lasting friendships that developed. The international friendships that grow up between the students, their host families, and chaperones really do continue a lifetime. There is also a chaperone dinner in both Host Cities, where past chaperones join in for an evening of fun and fellowship. At my event in Chiba, no less than 17 Japanese 'past' chaperones entertained me. It was a wondrous evening lasting well into the 'wee' hours.

I returned to Japan again a few years later as a Zone Chair representing District 19-A at the 40th Anniversary celebration of the exchange. The Mayor of North Vancouver and a number of Council Members also flew across the Pacific for a week of banquets, and civic functions, and to renew old acquaintances.

Our Exchange Program is well managed by Mount Seymour Lion Gary Nordhoj and Ambleside-Tiddlycove Lion PP George Sim, both of whom have been chaperones. This Student Exchange is very much alive and well and our goal is to have it continue for years to come.
