
Long Time Sooke Lion Published Biography

Border Arch Refurbishing

To commemorate 100 years of service, the Lions of District 19D chose to refurbish the border arch at the Canada/USA Border Crossing at Oroville/Osoyoos. The project entailed cleaning, repainting and installing a commemorative plaque, reminding all that Lions Clubs International has celebrated 100-years of service.

The arch was dedicated on Saturday, March 23, 1968 at 11:00 a.m. Below is the dedication speech and program.

Once again, The Lions of Multiple District 19 (British Columbia, Washington and Northern Idaho) are gathered here to join hands; this time in the dedication of our Friendship Arch. Not only in recognition of the friendship and fellowship between our two great nations, Canada and the United States of America, but also as another step forward in our Past President Edward Lindsey's worldwide program dedicated to the search for peace. The ceremony began with the singing of 'O Canada' and 'America' sung by the Osoyoos Jr. Secondary School Band and the Arch unveiled by the Honorable David Pugh, Member of Parliament, Canada...and the Honorable Bob McDougall, Washington State Representative. Mr. Pugh and Mr. McDougall addressed the attendees...Dr. George Kingston, District Governor of District D, and Edward Lindsay, immediate past president of Lions International were introduced and spoke to the attendees. A benediction was done by Past District Governor, Ray Sheward. The event was concluded with Star Spangled Banner and God Save the Queen by song leaders Al Smith PDG and Vern France Friendship Arch designer and builder. Dedication Arrangements by the Osoyoos Lions and Oroville Lions.

Fifty years later the Border Arch was showing its age. The time spent cleaning, painting and repairing have returned it to its former glory. A 100-Year Logo has been added to the arch. This was created by an artist from the Tonasket Lions Club, Janet Montanye, who plasma-cut the logo and helped install it. D-9 Zone Chairperson, Michael Livingstone spearheaded the renewal process with the help of the following Lions Club Members: From Tonasket, President Cathy Bailey with Janet

Montanye and Patti and George Hill; Okanagan Falls President Bob Wilson and Michael Livingstone and Penticton President Margaret Ashley.

Due to the numerous forest fires producing some of the worst smoke pollution in many years, the team had to revisit the project two years in a row to complete the task. As you can see by the picture, it was a job well done.

Youth Exchange - Time is Running Out

Time is running out to apply for a 2020 Youth Exchange Scholarship sponsored by the MD19 Lions Youth Exchange Foundation. December 31, 2019 is the deadline for submission of an application. Although a scholarship does not pay the full cost of an exchange, it provides substantial assistance.

In 2019 there were three youth in MD19 who each received a \$1,000 scholarship and then turned that into trips to Australia, Italy and Spain. Several others received scholarships from their local clubs and were able to travel to Japan, Switzerland and North Carolina. In 2018 the Foundation helped MD19 youth to travel to Australia and Italy.

Do you know a youth who will be 16 and not over 21 by June 1, 2020? If they would like to visit a different culture for from 4 to 6 weeks, Lions Youth Camps and Exchange may be the answer. Christmas Schedule for MD19 Office

The MD19 Office is closed December 23rd – January 1st. The Office will be open for business at 8:00 am on January 2, 2020. While closed, we will periodically try to respond to emails that have the MD19 Visitation Forms and candidate letters of Intent and Endorsements attached to them so that you will know that they have been received in the office by the deadline of December 31st. The date/time stamp on the email will also validate its on time submission.

In mid-January the MD19 Office will be **emailing** out to the Club Treasurers or Secretary-Treasurers the **MD19 Second Half Dues Statements**. If no email address is available, a hard copy will be sent to the Treasurer's address as it was recorded on the 2019-2020 LCI Club Officer Report Form (or subsequent updated information received). If you do not receive a dues bill by the end of January, please contact the MD19 Office, so that we can confirm your email or mailing address and resend the bill. Dues for the second half are based on the membership total recorded on the WMMR due December 31, 2019, plus pro-rated dues for any new members brought in from July to December.

Dues Increase: At the Annual Convention, held in Wenatchee, WA (October17-19, 2019) the delegates voted to accept the MD19 Dues Increase. The first increase begins with the January, 2020 dues statements and will be an additional \$3.00 for a total of \$12.30 per member. See the article in this Border Crossing for full explanation on the dues increase.

District Conferences / Conventions will begin the weekend of March 6th. It is important that the 2019-2020 First Half Dues have been paid prior to your conference or your voting Delegate(s) will be unable to vote. If you have not received a 2019-2020 First Half Dues statement, contact the MD19 Office for a copy immediately. Please confirm your club's correct contact information with the MD19 Office at the same time.

Voting at District Conferences: Elections will be held at each of the District Spring Conferences/Conventions for the District Governor, 1st and 2nd Vice District Governors, the 2020-2021 Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson. The ballot boxes containing the ballots for Council and Vice Council Chairpersons will remain sealed until all of the conferences/ conventions have been held. After the close of the final conference/convention, all of the ballots will be counted at the same time.

Candidates for Higher Office at the Zone and District levels: Your letter of intent and your club's letter of endorsement must be received by the MD19 Office, the District Governor and your Zone Chairperson on or before December 31st. This is an MD19 requirement!

Lions Project New Hope Thanks You

We want to thank everyone who stopped by the Lions Project New Hope Northwest table during the MD19 Annual Convention in Wenatchee. We met old friends and made new ones. We sold hats, shirts, and notebooks, raising money for our family camps and retreats. Unfortunately, as some of you discovered, we were only able to take cash. Many people don't carry cash anymore; I'm one of them. But here's some good news: the next time you see us, you'll be able to make donations and pay with a credit card, or even with your smart phone.

Lions Project New Hope started in

2011, sponsoring family camps and retreats for individual military service members. As with any Lions service project that people donate to, you want to know what the results are-stats and metrics. Over the last eight years, we have had 28 family camps and retreats, helping 746 adults and 664 children. A small army of Lions volunteers made this possible. Great numbers. But those numbers tell you what we did, but not how we did, or the outcomes and end results.

We know that lives have been changed, relationships restored, and reconciliations with spouses and children. We know, first hand, that suicides have been prevented—that one soldier's plans to commit suicide this last summer were cancelled after attending a retreat. We would all call that a significant and meaningful result. All of the efforts on our part and every penny spent is worth it, right there.

AFTER RETREAT CARE

When we started, we had sketchy follow up after a family camp or retreat—nothing official. Now we have ongoing support groups for families, individuals, and even caregivers. At the retreat, service members and families learned skills for coping and communication, and many resources. In the support groups, what they learned is built upon and grows, forming a more solid foundation. Through communication and sharing, they learn to manage, cope, grow, and continue healing.

THE FUTURE

Your donations over the last eight years have directly affected the lives of all these people. But here's the rub: the need has not gone away nor diminished. In fact, in some cases it has grown worse. A number of causes are to blame: A long war, multiple deployments, some stressful military occupations. Whatever the cause, we cannot stop helping. And our budget has grown.

We usually have two family camps, helping about 20 families, and three more retreats for individuals service members. Our budget has been \$27,000, with approximately \$16,000 going to the family camps. For FY2020, we are supporting a retreat for families at the Cannon Beach Conference Center in Cannon Beach, Oregon (www.cbcc.net). It costs an additional \$20,000, but we will help approximately 65 couples with children. It's easy to do the math and see the cost benefit. Families sign up at the cbcc.net website to attend, starting 15 January. We fund the retreat, and our Lions Project New Hope NW - VP of Operations leads the retreat—Isabella Colvin (facilitator, trainer, coordinator).

In closing, let me encourage you to add Lions Project New Hope Northwest as a line item in your annual budget. If you want to donate with a credit card, go to our website—then Volunteer/Donate—for the donate button. Anything you give is much appreciated and generates lasting results.

A Quick Reminder About the Dues Assessment

During the 98th Annual MD19 Annual Convention, delegates voted to increase the per member club assessment. That increase was based upon a recommendation that passed at the spring 2019 Council of Governors meeting. The minutes of that meeting can be found here https://lionsmd19.org/downloads/minutes-2019-spring.pdf. The following chart clarifies how those numbers add up.

Remember, clubs will be invoiced based upon the LCI membership as of December 31 and June 30 of the Lions fiscal year. The assessment is due payable to MD19 by February 28 and August 31. Please note this chart only reflects the assessment by MD19, LCI will charge separately. At the end of this assessment cycle in July 2026/2027 members will be paying US\$0.75 per month more than they are currently paying.
