- 2. Application to attend LCI's Advanced Leadership Institute – online application/registration needs to be submitted by December 26 in order to attend the March 26-28 ALI. Any member can apply if you have not yet served as a 1st vice district governor



What is an award? Webster says to give as a prize, reward or judgment





Some of the more common awards are President, Secretary and Treasurer Recognition of Excellence. There are also Club and Zone Chairperson excellence awards as well. All are awarded on a points basis; if you perform all the duties, you get the recognition. In some clubs the President will produce certificates of appreciation for a project or committee chairperson for jobs well done.

Others are recognitions for donations to different Lions funds. The best know recognition is the Melvin Jones Fellowship that is given by LCIF for a donation of \$1,000 (US dollars). Some clubs use this as an award and present it to a deserving Lion for many reasons that include just being a good Lion or for performing well in doing a project or some other service.

MD19 has the Gordon F. Smith Fellowship that is awarded to a deserving Lion selected by their club when the club makes a \$500 contribution to MD19 Lions CARE.

In district H there is the Camp Horizon Fellowship that also could be given to a deserving Lion that supports the camp or is just a hard worker. This fellowship is only \$25. In all cases with the fellowship there is a plaque or certificate and a lapel pin or medallion.

These awards and recognitions are available to both Canadian and American Lions.

There are other awards and recognitions that are usually reserved for Lions living in the US and for those in Canada.

In my next musing I will speak on some of the Canadian and American specific awards.

When I joined Lions, it was to be of service to my community and I did not feel that any recognition was necessary, but as I progressed in Lions it was always nice to be recognized even if only a club certificate for a job well done.

A great big Hello from MD19! Those of you who attended our MD19 Annual Convention virtual style, "The Year that Wasn't – Celebrating What Was!" seemed to have a great time. We changed things a little bit, and began the weekend of November 5 and 6, with Friday as a mix and mingle time, some videos, the opening Plenary Session (kick-off) and closed it out with a Trivia night. Saturday started with some great seminars, and our 2nd Plenary Session with International 2nd Vice President Patti Hill. We were able to present several awards, some thank-you's and recognize our sponsors: Northwest Lions Foundation, Plusoptix and MD19 Lions Foundation. Ella and her Pink Glasses

A Picture is Worth a Thousand Words

I'm sure the familiar saying; "A Picture is Worth a Thousand Words" resonates as you look at this photo of a baby named, Ella, sporting her new pink glasses. In fact, some of the words you might come up with are, "precious", "cute", and "sweet". Aside from those most adoring words, after knowing Ella's story, you might want to use words such as "Lions", "Vision Screening", and "Plusoptix". Obviously, not as appealing, but Ella and her pink glasses represent the fact that she was in need of glasses and her need was founded on a vision screening conducted by the local Lions Club.

Ella's First Screening

Kristi Voeller, of North Dakota, took her 6 month old daughter, Ella, for a vision screening conducted by the local Prairie Rose Lions Club at her MOPS Group in Bismarck. Kristi admits, she almost did not take baby Ella to get screened because she was only 6 months old and she had been seen regularly by the family pediatrician and there had not been any concerns. Since there was no one in line to get screened,



Kristi decided she would go ahead and take Ella. To Kristi's surprise, Ella was referred for further evaluation by an eye care professional. Even with the referral, Kristi thought it was some kind of fluke. However, she scheduled an appointment through the InfantSEE program for several months later. Not thinking there was any rush, she thought it was fine to wait until then. However, her husband, having to see the optometrist himself at about the same time, took Ella's referral information with him to his appointment and showed the optometrist the results of Ella's screening. Upon looking at the screening results, the optometrist suggested taking Ella to see her for a follow-up as soon as possible.

Ella Needs Glasses

After Ella was seen by the optometrist and given a series of tests, it was determined that Ella needed glasses. Kristi remarked at the difference in Ella's behavior after receiving her new pink glasses one week later. Ella became much more engaging, fascinated with her mommy's nose along with her toys, playing with the family dog and her big sister, 4 year old Emma. In addition, she had become more vocal, interested in her surroundings and environment by crawling more, and paying more attention to what is around her.

Ella's Glasses are Pink

How can you miss those pink glasses? Everywhere Ella goes; Kristi is stopped and asked about Ella's pink glasses. Ella loves her glasses and doesn't want to take them off. Ella's pink glasses have changed the way Ella sees everything around her. Not only does Ella look adorable, but even at 6 months old, Ella's sight has been improved all because of a vision screening conducted by the Prairie Rose Lions Club.

A Big Thanks to the Prairie Rose Lions Club

The Prairie Rose Lions Club, in keeping with the mission of Lions KidSightUSA, conducts vision screenings with the Plusoptix vision screener. Plusoptix is a proud partner of Lions KidSightUSA, a nation-wide program that brings Lions clubs across the country together to ensure young children receive eye screenings and follow-up care when needed. The Plusoptix vision screener ensures that children are screened for the most prevalent risk factors that may lead to the development of Amblyopia or "lazy eye". An early diagnosis means early correction and treatment. Thanks to the Prairie Rose Lions Club and early intervention, Ella's vision has been improved.

The When and Why of White Cane Days

The When and Why of White Cane Days & The Lions Sight Conservation Foundation of Washington & Northern Idaho

The idea to get the MD19 Lions, as a unified group, involved in a Sight Conservation and Eye-Donor Program was brought to MD19 Lions by PDG Jack Radford in 1965 at a Council of Governors' Meeting. As a Ham Radio Operator, he had gotten involved with other ham radio enthusiasts in an eye donor program that was growing across the country.

Sight Conservation, taking care of the precious gift of sight had become an integral part of the Lions organization ever since the famous speech delivered by Helen Keller in 1925 at the Lions International Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio:

"Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness; no little deaf, blind child untaught; no blind man or woman unaided? I appeal to you Lions, you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind. Will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in this crusade against darkness?"

Jack's goal was to get the cooperation of the Lions in this effort to help people who were blind and sight impaired. He opened the door and the Lions walked through.

In May 1968, the Lions Sight Conservation Foundation was approved by the MD19 Council of Governors. That July the Foundation applied to Lions Clubs International (LCI) for the Foundation to use the Lions Logo and name. At this time the Foundation considered an area-wide White Cane Days to provide the necessary funds to support the Foundation. It would be held April 4-5, 1969. All Lions Clubs would be encouraged to participate and information regarding this fundraiser would come from the foundation.

That same year, the Sight Conservation Foundation approved establishing an eye bank at UW hospital and a Piano Tuning School in Vancouver, WA. The eye bank would be called the Lions Eye Bank. These would be supported White Cane Days, April 4 & 5, 1969.

The report to the MD19 Lions Council of Governors reflects that this first White Cane Days effort was a tremendous success! "The Governors of both Washington and Idaho proclaimed April 4 & 5 as White Cane Days, as well as the mayors of many cities. The publicity incidental to White Cane Days was more than expected. At least four television stations, numerous radio stations, and dozens of newspapers poured forth on the subject at the suggestion of hundreds of Lions members. One of the most gratifying features of the White Cane Days project is the unity of purpose created among the Lions Clubs of the States of Washington and Idaho. Every geographical section of the area participated splendidly. Every Lions district in the area did its part."

The exact reasons why that first group of Trustees decided to select April and then moved the dates to May to hold White Cane Days will probably never be known. Our Founding Fathers are no longer with us to answer this question. However, in the decade of the 60's when the idea of having a special White Cane Safety Day in October had just become a reality, the Lions may not have even been fully aware of this event.

Planning and holding events in the fall always present a challenge. So many Lions clubs go dark during the summer months, so it takes a while for them to get up and running in September and October. Holding the White Cane Days in the spring gave this brand-new fund-raiser a much better chance of being a success. The leaders had the entire Lions year to promote and plan for this event.

The Lions of MD19 chose an iconic symbol, the White Cane that had been in use by blind and sight impaired people since the early 1900's in Europe, to represent their fund-raising efforts. That White Cane symbol tells the public that the Lions are in the business of all things dealing with sight by helping to conserve sight, restore sight and assist those organizations that work with people who are sight impaired and blind to lead more independent lives.

Christmas Schedule for MD19 Office

The MD19 Office is closed December 24th – January 2nd. The Office will be open for business at 8:00 am on January 3, 2022. While closed, we will periodically try to respond to emails that have the MD19 Visitation Forms and candidate letters of Intent and Endorsements attached to them so that you will know that they have been received in the office by the deadline of December 31st. The date/time stamp on the email will also validate its on time submission.

In mid-January the MD19 Office will be **emailing** out to the Club Treasurers or Secretary-Treasurers the **MD19 Second Half Dues Statements**. If no email address is available, a hard copy will be sent to the Treasurer's address as it was recorded on the 2021-2022 LCI Club Officer Report Form (or subsequent updated information received). If you do not receive a dues bill by the end of January, please contact the MD19 Office, so that we can confirm your email or mailing address and resend the bill. Dues for the second half are based on the membership total recorded on the WMMR due December 31, 2021, plus pro-rated dues for any new members brought in from July to December.

District Conferences / Conventions begin the weekend of March 11th. It is important that the 2021-2022 First Half Dues have been paid prior to your conference or your voting Delegate(s) will be unable to vote. If you have not received a 2021-2022 First Half Dues statement, contact the MD19 Office for a copy immediately. Please confirm your club's correct contact information with the MD19 Office at the same time.

Voting at District Conferences: Elections will be held at each of the District Spring Conferences/Conventions for the District Governor, 1st and 2nd Vice District Governors, the 2022-2023 Council Chairperson and Vice Council Chairperson. The ballot boxes containing the ballots for Council and Vice Council Chairpersons will remain sealed until all of the conferences/conventions have been held. After the close of the final conference/convention, all of the ballots will be counted at the same time.

Candidates for Higher Office at the Zone and District levels: Your letter of intent and your club's letter of endorsement must be received by the MD19 Office, the District Governor and your Zone Chairperson on or before December 31st. This is a Constitutional requirement!

Any Candidate for MD19 Vice Council Chairperson: Your letter of Intent, your Club's Letter of Endorsement and must be received by the MD19 Office, the District Governor, and the Vice District Governor on or before December 31st.

Hello from the BC/Yukon Director of LFCDG. I am PZC Richard Simonson, a member of the Port Coquitlam Lions Club since 1987. I served as an officer of the Club for a good many years, primarily as Club Secretary. I have served several District Governors on Cabinet, several times as the Chairperson for Lions Foundation of Canada.

Having been born in rural farming community in Alberta, I grew up believing in serving my community and have accomplished through several different venues but primarily Lions. The biggest portion of my working career was with the Canadian Pacific Railroad at Port Coquitlam, British Columbia, retiring after 35 years.

Though approved by MD 19 to serve as Director beginning in 2020, it was delayed a year by the sitting Board of Directors in 2020, due to Covid19, to preserve continuity through a very unsettling time. I, along with the other new Directors began our 3-year terms in October 2021 and settling down to the business at hand.
