At Easter Seals Camps, Anything Is Possible By Mohini Takhar

On September 30th, we participated in a 5K Easter Seals obstacle run at Swangard Stadium and raised more than \$95,000. How can we who have disabilities accomplish so much? In the famous phrase of Easter Seals BC/Yukon, it's because "camp is the best place on earth". Easter Seals, with the support of the BC Lions Society, provides accessible camps for children and recently opened them to young adults as well. These camps, located in Squamish, Winfield and Shawnigan, are designed for people with disabilities.



I have been going to Camp Squamish for the past four years. One word that sums up my experience is "magical". At Camp, you can be your own superhero. At Easter Seals campsites, anything is possible. Children are able to face their fears and try

things they have never done before. There is this activity called "The Big Swing", but essentially it's ziplining. The first time I tried ziplining, I was both thrilled and terrified! It was the best feeling I've ever felt. That's what this camp gives you. It gives you the opportunity to surprise yourself in wonderful ways. That's the great thing about the camp. You can let go and be yourself, probably in ways you didn't even know about. You discover yourself and find the things you love.

Being yourself is a big, complicated topic for people with disabilities. My 24-year-old friend Emily An-

In December, the families of sixteen Lions in Districts C, D, E and F will host 9 young people from Australia. When the appeal for hosts went out there were over 20 inquiries for information. In a few months, youth from other countries will inquire about opportunities to visit beautiful MD19. They will be primarily from Europe and Japan.

and Lion membership. The Canada/USA Forum in Portland raised some questions about service to our communities and Lions membership. Lions International President Aggarwal, our keynote speaker, told Lions we needed 50,000 new members to bring our Lions membership to 1,500,000 members. He also spoke of the importance of Leo Members to the future of Lions International. We have 175,500 Leo members that serve their communities alongside their sponsoring Lions Clubs. They volunteer, they fund raise, and run their own service projects alongside Lions Clubs. Leo Clubs are outstanding assets in all the communities that host them. Why don't we fully recognize this?

We have been told for many that "Leos are the Future of Lions". Now is the time for Leos to be given recognition for their service. Leos are our "Partners in Service" and as such could be recognized fully in LCI stats as "Members in Service". Such recognition could motivate more Leos to join Lions Clubs when they reach the age of majority. The recognition of Leos as full members of the Lions International Association would show Leos how we respect their community service efforts. This would bring our membership (1,450,000 Lions plus 175,500 Leos in 7,020 Leo Clubs), to a total of 1,625,500 members.

The Leos deserve as much respect and recognition as we can give them. They serve their community with energy, enthusiasm and strength, and generate new ideas for service programs. These Leo members would remain Leos but would be given credit and attention like other Lions.

In 1987, women were accepted as full members in Lions. As a consequence, our Lions movement grew

and prospered in ways few could have anticipated. Today we have the opportunity to better integrate Leos into our fold, which will lead to the future positive growth of our Lions.

"ARTICLE VII "BL" SECTION 3 a. 4.

A District Cabinet may only endorse one (1) candidate for each position above the district level. The District Cabinet endorsement of the Vice Council Chairperson will be secured at a regularly scheduled District Cabinet Meeting prior to December 31st of the Lions Year in which the election will take place for the offices of candidates for Vice Council Chairperson and Council Chairperson. A letter from the District Cabinet Secretary along with the minutes of the Cabinet Meeting where the endorsement was passed must be received by the Multiple District Secretary-Treasurer from the district **cabinet secretary** prior to December 31st. The incumbent Vice Council Chairperson is not required to seek endorsement of his/her District Cabinet as a candidate for the office of Council Chairperson"

"ARTICLE V SECTION 6

Regular meetings of the Multiple District Council of Governors shall be held The Vice Council Chairperson (Incoming Council Chairperson) may convene a **an unfunded** special meeting of the following year's Council of Governors at the **Annual Convention** regularly scheduled **Spring Council of Governors' Meeting** for the primary purpose of **considering and reviewing the approving the** appointments of the MD19 Committee Chairpersons and members and the **approved MD** Multiple District Budget for the following Lions Year."

CLUB DUES: MD19 First Half Dues for 2017-18 are past due. If the Treasurer or Secretary/Treasurer did not receive a dues statement, please contact the MD19 Office.



CLUB OFFICER CHANGES: Please inform the MD19 Office right away when there is a change in your club President,

Secretary or Treasurer. The new officer information will be included in the Cut-n-Paste section of *The Border Crossing* and the master mailing list will be updated for future mailings from the MD19 Office. We do not receive the information from LCI when you only post a change on the LCI website.

SUBMITTING THE CLUBS' WMMR: Club Secretaries need to be aware that if no membership changes have occurred in the month of the report they STILL NEED TO GO ONLINE and indicate that nothing has changed by clicking on "Report no Membership Changes for (<u>current month</u>)" under the 'task' section on their clubs' MyLCI site. Otherwise they will not be given credit for submitting a report for that month. Please submit SAR each month.

Backdated information for the previous two months submitted during the next month will not be considered the missing months' report. Submitting the information is good for keeping accurate membership records. That is important and encouraged, but you won't receive credit for submitting the MMR that was not submitted by the last day of the specific month.

When submitting your report for the month it is better to submit earlier in the month in case there are internet issues with LCI on the last day of the month.

ZONE MEETINGS (District Governor Advisory Meeting): You probably have attended your first zone meeting for the 2017-18 year. Zone Chairpersons are required to report which Presidents and Secretaries were in attendance at the meeting. It is important that you also record your club's attendance at the zone meeting on your Club's Monthly Visitation Form, indicating that the President and Secretary were in attendance. This is in case the Zone Chairperson does not send in the required report.

The Border Crossing: Officers of MD19, which includes Club Presidents, Secretaries, Zone Chairpersons, etc., who have supplied the MD19 Office an email address are automatically added to our AWeber communications system and sent a link for *The Border Crossing* when a new issue is uploaded to our MD19 Website. If you do not receive any AWeber messages from this office then you will need to sign up for *The Border Crossing* through our website. All Clubs who meet the above criteria must submit a Club President Excellence Award form to the Multiple District 19 Office postmarked by July 25th of the following Lions year. The Multiple District 19 Office will email out this form to all clubs in March.
