#### **Back Pack - School Supplies Project**

The North Whidbey Lions seek to serve all those in need in our community, but the club seems to lean toward contributions to our youth and our school district in general. We are proud of their accomplishments and often seek ways to enhance the experience of Oak Harbor students. With that



as a backdrop my favorite North Whidbey Lions project is our school supplies collection program which we call the "Backpack Project".

Though our school district is not very large we have found we have many youth with significant personal challenges. In the 2017-2018 school year the Oak Harbor School were found to be serving 285 homeless students. 75 were identified as unaccompanied. This meant they had no parents or adults being responsible for them. 33 of these youth had no shelter, so they had to find a way to survive within their circumstances. Obviously, these young people needed support in order to have any chance for success in our schools. Through supporting the local Opportunity Council, the North Whidbey Lions have engaged in a school supplies collection program. With coordination with the Opportunity Council and our local Walmart we set up a school supplies collection. We have found the citizens of Oak Harbor are very willing to donate and when we are finished, we are able to put together about 350 back packs filled with appropriate school supplies.

As a retired teacher this program is my favorite. After collection of the supplies and distributing to all the back packs I have a very warm feeling knowing that we are contributing to at least a few students having a better chance to gaining a good education.

Orson was born and raised in Oak Harbor, Washington and graduated from Oak Harbor High School in 1957. He received his BA in Education from Pacific Lutheran University and his Masters in Education from Seattle University. Orson became a teacher and coach with 14 years at the High School level and then 26 years as a college football coach and teacher. In 1959 Orson married Diana Allison. His family began with two daughters, joined by an adopted son, and later two foster daughters. Diana and Orson have been blessed with seven grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren.

Orson's Lions experience began In 1977 when he became a member of the Bremerton Central Lions. When he moved to Nebraska to teach and coach in 1981, he



He served as faculty member at the Northwest Lions Leadership Institute and has enjoyed his experience as a choir member on the Christmas Ship. He considers it as a privilege to have served as 1st and 2nd Vice District Governor and at the District 19 H Spring Conference Orson became District Governor.

#### **COVID-19 and Type 2 Diabetes**

In March, Tom Hanks disclosed he had COVID-19. He was especially lucky to make a full recovery, since he has Type 2 diabetes. That precondition makes folks more likely to develop serious complications from the virus.

A study of 200 COVID-19 patients with existing diabetes suggests that diabetes presents a "fertile ground for the virus' inflammatory surge." That then knocks diabetes out of control and results in "severe insulin resistance and severe hyperglycemia." That in turn makes COVID's complications, such as renal failure and low blood pressure, more likely to lead to persistent problems or even death.

Another study of COVID patients that included 952 with diabetes found those folks had higher rates of in-hospital death (1.1% without diabetes versus 11% with), acute respiratory distress syndrome (7.1% versus 21.4%) and heart injury (1.4% vs. 9.9%). Those with poorly controlled glucose levels also had higher rates of septic shock, kidney dysfunction and stroke.

That's why it's important to get your diabetes under control, to protect yourself from infection and, if infected, to be aggressive about managing your glucose level. We urge you to make and keep appointments (telemedicine and/or in person) with your diabetes doctor; monitor your blood sugar regularly, take your medication as prescribed, and push to get your A1C below 6.4%. In addition, aim for 60 minutes of exercise five days a week and avoid highly processed foods and red meats. Also, stockpile two months' worth of diabetes medications, insulin, and supplies. If you get sick, you'll need them.

#### **COVID-19 May Cause Sudden Diabetes**

It was once considered primarily a respiratory illness, but COVID-19 has consistently surprised doctors by the sheer number of body systems it can affect, including the brain and the heart. Now, researchers say, the coronavirus may even attack cells in the pancreas, causing diabetes.

In the Sept. 2 issue of the journal Nature Metabolism, scientists reported on the case of a 19-year-old German man who developed coronavirus after a family vacation. He had no traditional symptoms of COVID-19, until he ended up in the hospital with a 26-pound weight loss inside a few weeks, frequent urination and pain in his left side.

Doctors found his blood sugar level was more than three times the normal range. They suspected the patient had Type 1 diabetes (which is usually diagnosed in early childhood), but he tested negative for genetic variants and antibodies normally associated with Type 1.

Both diabetes and COVID can cause immune overreaction

People develop diabetes when the pancreas stops producing enough insulin, an enzyme that ushers sugar from the blood into cells, where they can use it for energy. Excessive blood sugar can damage the walls of blood vessels, which can lead to heart disease, stroke, blindness and amputation.

In the case of the 19-year-old German patient, researchers theorize that the coronavirus caused his immune system to attack beta cells in the pancreas, which process insulin. Those cells contain many neurotransmitters known as ACE2 receptors. Coincidentally, those receptors are where the spiked surface of the coronavirus attach to cells. (Type 1 diabetes is also believed to be an autoimmune disorder, in which the body attacks healthy beta cells and shuts them down.)

#### COVID-19 Message from Dr. Bonnie Henry, Provincial Health Officer for B.C.

A voice of reason for those who may think they've become a tad paranoid...

Dr. Bonnie Henry is the Provincial Health Officer for British Columbia, the first woman in this position.

She is also an associate professor at the University of British Columbia.

She has a background in epidemiology and is a specialist in public health and preventive medicine.

She is from Prince Edward Island.

Dr. Bonnie says:

- 1. We may have to live with COVID-19 for months or years. Let's not deny it or panic. Let's not make our lives useless. Let's learn to live with this fact.
- 2. You can't destroy COVID-19 viruses that have penetrated cell walls, by drinking gallons of hot water . . . you'll just go to the bathroom more often.
- 3. Washing hands and maintaining a two-meter physical distance is the best method for your protection.
- 4. If you don't have a COVID-19 patient at home, there's no need to disinfect the surfaces at your house.
- 5. Packaged cargo, gas pumps, shopping carts and ATMs do not cause infection. If you wash your hands, live your life as usual.
- 6. COVID-19 is not a food infection. It is associated with drops of infection like the 'flu. There is no demonstrated risk that COVID-19 is transmitted by food.
- 7. You can lose your sense of smell with a lot of allergies and viral infections. This is only a non-specific symptom of CO-VID-19.
- 8. Once at home, you don't need to change your clothes (iron it) urgently and go shower! Purity is a virtue, paranoia is not!
- 9. The COVID-19 virus doesn't hang in the air for long. This is a respiratory droplet infection that requires close contact.
- 10. The air is clean, you can walk through the gardens and through parks (just keeping your physical protection distance).
- 11. It is sufficient to use normal soap against COVID-19, not antibacterial soap. This is a virus, not a bacteria.
- 12. You don't have to worry about your food orders. But you can heat it all up in the microwave, if you wish.
- 13. The chances of bringing COVID-19 home with your shoes is like being struck by lightning twice in a day. I've been working against viruses for 20 years drop infections don't spread like that!
- 14. You can't be protected from the virus by taking vinegar, sugarcane juice and ginger! These are for immunity not a cure.
- 15. Wearing a mask for long periods interferes with your breathing and oxygen levels. Wear it only in crowds.
- 16. Wearing gloves is also a bad idea; the virus can accumulate into the glove and be easily transmitted if you touch your face. Better just to wash your hands regularly. Immunity is greatly weakened by always staying in a sterile environment. Even if you eat immune boosting foods, please go out of your house regularly to any park/beach. Immunity is increased by EXPOSURE TO PATHOGENS, not by sitting at home and consuming fried/ spicy/sugary/high carb foods.

Be smart and stay informed! Live life sensibly and to the fullest. Be Kind, Be Calm and Be Safe!

#### **Vital Information**

**CLUB DUES:** MD19 First Half Dues for 2020-21 are past due. If the Treasurer or Secretary/Treasurer did not receive a dues statement, please contact the MD19 Office.

**ANNUAL CONVENTION:** This will be a virtual convention. Information for registering is found in this issue of the Border Crossing.

**CLUB OFFICER CHANGES:** Please inform the MD19 Office right away when there is a change in your club President, Secretary or Treasurer. The new officer information will be included in the Cut-n-Paste section of The Border Crossing and the master mailing list will be updated for future mailings from the MD19 Office. We do not receive the information from LCI when you only post a change on the LCI website.

**SUBMITTING THE CLUBS' WMMR:** Club Secretaries need to be aware that if no membership changes have occurred in the month of the report they STILL NEED TO GO ONLINE and indicate that nothing has changed by clicking on "Report no Membership Changes for (current month)" under the 'task' section on their clubs' MyLCI site. Otherwise they will not be given credit for submitting a report for that month.

Backdated information for the previous two months submitted during the next month will not be considered the missing months' report. Submitting the information is good for keeping accurate membership records. That is important and encouraged, but you won't receive credit for submitting the MMR that was not submitted by the last day of the specific month.

When submitting your report for the month it is better to submit earlier in the month in case there are internet issues with LCI on the last day of the month.

Recently we've been having issues with Chrome. It has been suggested using a different browser. We've been informed by LCI that clearing your cache (browsing history) will clear up the issue with Chrome.

**ZONE MEETINGS (District Governor Advisory Meeting):** You probably have attended your first zone meeting for the 2020-21 year. And more than likely it's been a Zoom Meeting. Zone Chairpersons are required to report which Presidents and Secretaries (and Alternates if applicable) attended the meeting. It is important that you also record your club's attendance at the zone meeting on your Club's Monthly Visitation Form, indicating that the President and Secretary were in attendance. This is in case the Zone Chairperson does not send in the required report.

**The Border Crossing:** Officers of MD19, which includes Club Presidents, Secretaries, Zone Chairpersons, etc., who have supplied the MD19 Office an email address are automatically added to our AWeber communications system and sent a link for The Border Crossing when a new issue is uploaded to our MD19 Website. If you do not receive any AWeber messages from this office and you would like to be informed when the new issue is available then you will need to sign up for The Border Crossing through our website. On the main page of the site (www.lionsmd19.com) click on the Border Crossing icon and on the next page fill out the form and hit submit. You will receive a confirmation email that you need to give permission in order for AWeber to send you messages.

The Northwest Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center (NWLERC) has had many changes this year. We are waiting for our final inspection on the new warehouse. The drainage ditch is in place and the county mandated landscaping on the side of the building due to a new housing development that will be coming soon to the neighborhood. Lion Roberta Pinson (Lacey Sunrise Lions) has done a wonderful job getting the trees and shrubs planted with a work crew from Lacey Sunrise Lions and is watering the grounds nearly every day in this heat.



NWLERC had to close the doors in the spring due to the pandemic. Our VP of operations, Lion Ike Ikari (Lacey Sunrise Lions), and his partner in crime, Lion Marty Ikari (Yelm Lions) have implemented new safety guidelines so we can slowly reopen for volunteers. We have to limit the number of volunteers at any one time. If you would like to bring down a group please call first and discuss this with Ike or Marty. Through their leadership the space has been altered to allow 6 feet of separation at workstations. On entering with a mask already on, Site Managers, will take your temperature and request that you wash your hands.

Currently there is one mission request that has been on hold since March and no new requests for the past six months. During this down-time we have built up our supply of all types of glasses and also have a large back up of glasses needing to be read on the lensometer. We also have tens of thousands of glasses still waiting to be inspected, washed and polish thanks to our friends Ridwell (a recycling company in Seattle) that sent us 64 boxes to process.



You have helped collect over two million pair of glasses since we opened. We have sent glasses on about 350 mission trips. You have helped about 300,000 people see better- most in places that are so remote glasses were just a dream.
